


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Dream Catchers in FSD




Second Step

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is a framework for organizing systems and practices that focus on creating a positive and supportive school culture for all. Ladera Vista Junior High School for the Arts utilizes this practice in the daily operation of the school and informs students and parents of the expectations while they are on campus

throughout the school year.

The PBIS team of teachers and staff, meets regularly to discuss student behavior and school climate. The team creates and revises a PBIS matrix of student expectations for behavior in the classrooms, hallways, lunch area, etc. The team is also responsible for designing lessons and activities to teach and reteach our students the

expectations throughout the year. This process helps us create a positive and equitable school environment where students are given clear expectations and held accountable for their choices.

One way we are encouraging positive behavior is by using the PBIS Rewards App on our iPads to award students PBIS points for doing the right thing. Students can use their points to purchase prizes from our online PBIS store. The prizes are packaged and delivered to classes by ASB students.

Another way we encourage students to demonstrate Spartan PRIDE is with our Super Spartan Quarterly celebrations! Each quarter, teachers select one student who best demonstrates Spartan PRIDE. Students receive certificates, special treats, and enjoy an elongated break!

Here at Ladera Vista, we will continue to create a positive and supportive school culture where we regularly celebrate student and school achievements.

In March of 2022, a Parks team and district leaders will attend the California Schools to Watch Conference in Monterey, CA, hosted by the nonprofit California League of Schools to celebrate their recognition as a model school serving middle-grades students. The school joins 137

existing California Schools to Watch and 15 other newlynamed schools for 2022.

In June of 2022, a school team will also attend the Schools to Watch National Conference in Washington, D.C. There, they will celebrate their recognition as a National School to Watch, joining middle-grades schools nationwide to share the honor.

The program is sponsored by the California Department of Education, California League of Schools, and the California Middle Grades Alliance, in association with the National Forum. To earn the designation, schools must complete an extensive application and host a site visit by middle-grades experts. To retain the designation, each school is re-evaluated every three years.
