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Fullerton School District's Speech and Debate Team Named National Champs for Fifth Year in a Row



Fullerton School District's National Speech and Debate team, made up of 20 students in grades sixth through eighth representing various schools from across the district, took top 2024 NSDA honors.

(*Fullerton, CA*) - For the fifth consecutive year, Fullerton School District's Parks Junior High has earned top honors at the National Speech and Debate Association's (NSDA) championship tournament as an Overall School of Excellence in Speech and Debate. 170 schools spanning 36 states and five countries had students competing in NSDA's 2024 national competition, and Parks Junior High is one of only three schools to be awarded this prestigious recognition.

FSD's 20 Speech and Debate competitors joined nearly 800 students at this year's NSDA national showdown, showcasing their public speaking skills in a variety of competitive speaking categories and vying for nationals' hardware. In addition to Parks Junior High's overall sweepstakes win, three FSD students, Natalie Hong, Annette Lee, and Apollo Meneses, were named individual national champions in the categories of Program Oral Interpretation, Original Oratory, and Humorous Interpretation, respectively.

Emily McDougall, an Educational Services Director for FSD who oversees the district's Speech and Debate program, shared that FSD started its speech and debate program with a trial cohort in 2017. The program is now available to all students in fourth through eighth grades at each of FSD's 20 school campuses. McDougall also noted that the expansion and success of the program have been made possible through a successful partnership with Advantage Communications, which organization helps provide coaching staff, competition preparation, and more.

Adriena Toghia, District Director and Vice President for Advantage Communications, shared that FSD's showing in the 2024 NSDA national championship saw 38 FSD-entered events advance through preliminary rounds, up from 12 events last year. In addition, while FSD's team primarily focuses on speech events at this tournament, Parks Junior High's points totaled so highly that it earned the team a spot points-wise in the Speech and Debate section.

"Public speaking is an invaluable skill that will serve our students in their personal and professional endeavors for the rest of their lives," said Hilda Sugarman, President of the Fullerton Education Foundation (FEF) and Vice President of FSD's Board of Trustees, who supported fundraising efforts through FEF to help FSD's 20-student speech and debate team travel to Des Moines, Iowa to compete in June.

NSDA has been hosting the national middle school competition since 2010, and an NSDA representative shared that the number of entries in every competitive category grew from 2023 to 2024, making this one of the most competitive competitions yet. For example, at the 2023 tournament, there was an average of 31 entries in each speech event, and in 2024, there were around 88 entries in each event.

According to NSDA, many who have roots as NSDA members represent industry leaders and nationally recognized household names, including Supreme Court justices Ketanji Brown Jackson and Sonia Sotomayor, acclaimed broadcast news reporters Tom Llamas and Stephen Colbert, Academy Award winners Jordan Peele and Brad Pitt, and countless others.

"The tournament is a moving reminder of how the skills students learn in speech and debate empower them to be changemakers, advocates, and future leaders of our world," shared NSDA in a press release announcing the location of this year's tournament.

FSD also had numerous students earn top honors in NSDA's 2024 virtual tournament, who were also honored during their recent board meeting, illuminating the interest and success of FSD's Speech and Debate programming.
